
From December 16, 2019 up to and including January 3, 2019 school will be closed.

SCS Clubs and Extra Curricular Activities Program 2019-2020

On Tuesday, August 27, 2019 SCS held its second annual Clubs and Extra Curricular Activities Market headed by new Clubs and ECA Coordinator Tracy Zagers-Johnson. The market showcased about 25 different After School Clubs, as well as about 7 different Extra Curricular Activities that students could choose from this year. Clubs are held for the most part after school from 2:30-4:00pm, with the exception of a few clubs held at a later time or on Saturdays. ECAs are held on Tuesdays from 12:30-

2:00pm for students of Forms 1, 2 and PrO and last a total of 10 weeks each term. Students must then choose a different ECA to take part in the next term.

All students at SCS are required to take part in two different after school clubs or one club that meets twice per week. The implementation of the After School Clubs and ECAs Program is in line with the SCS mission and vision statements which aim to develop our young people holistically. Some new clubs on board this year include West Indian Cooking Club, Tapas Club, Track and Field Club, Girls Club, Body Attack Club, Lego Tech Club, Mastermind Game Club, How It Works IT Club, Saba Radio Club and Guitar Club.

SCS takes part in Student Exchange Program in Romania

On Thursday, August 30, 2019 a group of six SCS Form 4 Academic students, along with Group Leaders Tracy Zagers-Johnson and Peter Johnson, traveled to Oradea, Romania to participate in a student exchange program, along with other participants and group leaders from Romania, Turkey and Finland. This amazing opportunity was made possible by the European Union Erasmus + Youth in Action Program, as well as by the Saba Educational Foundation Board. All participants took part in a very intense, action packed week long program centered around the theme: "Art as a Tool for Inclusion."

The program began with meet and greet ice breaker activities and name games, followed by making collective portrait art, agreeing upon the rules for the exchange and ended with a trekking and discovering the iconic art of the city. Each day a different country was responsible for the morning ice breaker games and every day concluded with an evaluation at the leaders meetings. Day two students were able to participate in psychological and theater art workshops, after which they prepared their own skits based on famous paintings from each country.

Day three was the highlight of the week which entailed a tour of one of the local museums, power point presentations on museums in their own countries and then working in groups and making virtual presentations on how to make museums more inclusive. The day ended with video presentations of each country and a cultural market where each country showcased the popular foods, drinks, art, cultural wear and dance of their respective countries. Day four students were treated to various dance workshops and then created their own choreographed dances which they presented at the end of the day.

The last day was spent evaluating the program, making future plans, packing and participants were also treated to some shopping time. The week ended with all participants receiving their Youth Pass certificates, followed by a movie presentation and a farewell dinner and get together. Through this program, participants were able to step out of their comfort zone, interact with persons of different cultural backgrounds and gain more knowledge, skills and confidence through participating in the various activities planned. All participants expressed a keen interest in Saba and looked forward to planning another student exchange on Saba in the near future. All SCS participants and group leaders returned home on Monday, September 9, 2019.
